Karen Gimson Landscaper Garden Designer

A very enjoyable evening. Karen gave us an insight on the gardens she has had the pleasure to design ... always trying to use the more sustainable plants and flowers beneficial to birds, bees and insects.



Her talk was very informative on the type of perennials and annuals to use for different times of the year... giving us lots of tips on the best place to position them ...as well as showing us great slides of the various gardens she has designed and the shrubs and flowers she used. Her talk

was accompanied by a list of plants that she used.

She is also a wonderful flower arranger and showed us some of the beautiful door wreaths she has created from silver birch stems. More ideas for arranging flowers without causing any damage to the environment using harmful products. One nice idea was to float the heads of hellebore, snowdrops, violas and bellis daisy in water to make very pretty table decorations.

Karen does lots of talks and if you listen to Radio Leicester, you will hear her on a Wednesday at 3:00pm, or sometimes on a Saturday afternoon.

#### **Broughton Astley**



Paul and Sue Gardner and Simon Grant were our guest speakers to talk about their "Experiences in Pantomime" at the Concordia Theatre, Hinckley. Paul told us some history of pantomimes which date back to mediaeval times and are uniquely English. Jack Marvin started pantomimes in Barwell in the

1950s, which then moved to Earl Shilton Working Men's Club and then to the Concordia Theatre in 1971, when the first pantomime was "Humpty Dumpty". Paul, who always liked to play the baddy, joined in 1976 and performed there for 20 years. The Concordia's pantomimes are always in the traditional style with the principal boy played by a girl and the Dame by a man, and this was Simon's role. He explained that the Dame has to wear a different costume every time she goes on stage in a new scene, maybe the whole costume or just wig, hat or shoes. That makes for some very quick changes, which could be very challenging for the Dame and the dresser! Timing is critical with lines being addressed to the audience but intended for the character on stage. Audiences love it when actors forget their lines and have to ad lib — Oh yes they do! It was a very entertaining evening which everyone enjoyed.

A group met for coffee and cake at the Garden Barn in Cotesbach, some saw a production of "The Book Thief" at The Curve and other theatre trips are booked, as well, of course, "Puss in Boots" at the Concordia in January!

#### Whissendine

At our meeting in October we finally met the River Ranger from Severn Trent, Luke. He started by telling us that the team was set up in 2021 to monitor river health. They do all sorts of things including meeting with community groups, working with the Wildlife Trust, river sampling and responding to reports of pollution or spillage. They also do green recovery schemes such as replacing old lead pipes, installing water gardens and putting in permeable paving slabs to prevent flooding.

They have recently installed these slabs in Mansfield, what a good idea! One thing I found quite amusing is when he talked about RNAGS, this stands for Reasons for Not Achieving Good Status and they try to keep this figure as low as possible. We talked about our concerns regarding new housing and the flooding in Whissendine, he didn't avoid any questions and if he didn't have an immediate answer he promised to look into it and reply. It was an interesting evening talking to a thoroughly decent chap.

#### Elmesthorpe

We welcomed Gurtej Matharu from Leicester, a self taught designer and maker of bespoke bridal and evening wear gowns. After watching his grandmother sewing, he overcame obstacles to lose himself in a world of creativity. To conclude the evening, Gurtej gave



members a long length of exquisite material, pins and a pair of scissors, then asked them to dress 4 mannequins with a sari.

A successful fund raiser beetle drive, with tea/coffee and home made cakes, was well supported by friends and members from the High Cross group.

#### Leire



Alison Briggs gave a talk on a Leicester based Charity "Inter Care Africa". The charity, set up by a GP in 1974 focused on tackling medical waste to save lives by channelling surplus

equipment and medicines to health units in Africa. The processes and scale of their work has evolved over time and currently covers a catchment area of 11 million people. Last year 464 boxes and a shipping container of medical aid valued at £684,500 was transported. Alison provided leaflets about the Charity and items that can be recycled such as bandages, scissors, stethoscopes and plasters. Regulations now require all medicines to be provided by dispensaries or manufacturers. The charity also recycles jewellery, watches, printer cartridges, stamps, laptops and foreign currency to boost funds and our members have collected items to donate. Alison brought in a collection of jewellery and handmade cards which members could purchase.



In October, we were very grateful to John Goodacre for stepping in to talk to us following the cancellation of our scheduled speaker. John's PowerPoint presentation was titled "Carrifran Wildwood and Beyond: Rewilding in the heart of Southern Scotland". This is a project that he

and his wife Stephanie have been involved in and is now the Wildwood Group of Borders Forest Trust.

The project of planting trees commenced in January 2000 and the species of trees were based on the history of the landscape. The organisation has grown and taken on other sites and there has been much interest from other key organisations as well as books published. There was an interesting discussion with members afterwards.

#### Groby

Our October speaker was Susie Lickman, who gave us tips and hints for keeping houseplants healthy (or alive in some cases!). In a complete change of career, Susie opened her own shop in the old fire station, Market Harborough in November 2022.

One of Susie's favourite plants is an African Violet as her Mum used to love them, and she donated a fine specimen as a raffle prize at the meeting.

Susie had two top tips to keep healthy houseplants: Natural light and watering.

Natural light is essential and it is important that consideration is given to the position of the plant within the home. We will now all be rushing round our houses to move our plants to their optimal site!

The biggest cause of house plant deaths is either over-watering or under-watering. Susie will water her many house plants, using tepid water, about once a month, and always from the bottom. It is preferable to use rainwater. Although she did not necessarily advocate feeding houseplants, she said that Baby Bio during the growing season can be used.

She answered our many questions about ailing house plants, and the talk was extremely interesting and helpful. The plants she had brought with her were all offered for sale.

#### Sheepy

Our October meeting was also our AGM.

The business side of things was dealt with first with reports from Treasurer, Secretary and Madam chair. These were proposed, and seconded. The new committee was voted in. We have slightly more members this year than last year. 30 members attended this evening, which is brilliant as AGM often puts people off.

Jacob was 6 at the time and the connection between those good times, his dad and the table were strong. But the table was dilapidated and needed mending. Heather and Jacob appeared on The Repair Shop programme in June 2022, when Jacob was able to explain how much the table meant to him. The team renovated the table beautifully, and both Heather and Jacob were thrilled to see it in perfect working order once more and members could agree as Heather brought the table to our meeting to show the table fully restored and assured us that it is being used daily once again. As Jay Blades agreed, there will be plenty of opportunity for Jacob and his grandmother to form many more happy memories around the now no-longer rickety table.


