# **Subscriptions 2025 -26**

The NFWI Board of Trustees has set the membership subscription for the 2025/26 membership year at £51.00.

This means there will be a £3 increase from the current membership year: £1.50 of this increase will go to WIs, 75p to federations and 75p to NFWI

The distribution of the 2025-26 subscription will be:

Payments will be due from members in April 2025.

#### **Flexibility Policy**

WIs can apply the flexibility policy to their 2025/26 subscription. This means they can charge the full amount of the WI portion, reduce their portion, or waive the WI portion of the subscription entirely.

#### **Dual Membership**

Dual members will pay the WI portion only to their second WI. If the WI is not utilising the flexibility policy, this will be £25.10. There is no pro-rata rate for dual membership, and the set fee will remain payable at any time during the year.

# Women's Institute Speaker Circuit: A Reflection by Ray Lowry

I'm sitting in a village hall, the smell of disinfectant rising faintly from the polished floorboards, waiting to give a light-hearted talk to the Women's Institute. The chairs are stacked in haphazard towers against the walls; there's a trestle table in the corner with a checked cloth draped over it and, next to that, a tray of tea things. The WI, I've discovered, is a vibrant, occasionally riotous collective of women who – alongside baking, crafting and raising thousands for charity – like nothing better than to let their hair down and have a good laugh. I know this because I've been on their speaking circuit for years now, schlepping about the countryside to entertain them with anecdotes from my rather patchwork career: part-doctor, part-dentist, part-comedy writer. A jack of all trades, really, and master of none – except perhaps the art of getting lost on the way to obscure village halls.

It wasn't always like this. When I started doing these talks, I was overly polite, tiptoeing around anything that might seem risqué. I was, in short, the human equivalent of a cucumber sandwich – perfectly inoffensive and just as flavourless. But then one day, at a WI in some hamlet whose name I've since forgotten, the chairwoman took me to one side. "We like to have a good laugh," she said, "a proper belly laugh. So don't hold back." She said it like a challenge, and who was I to refuse?

The next time I spoke, I was bolder. I threw in a few cheeky stories, and they howled. It was the kind of laughter that builds until it shakes the room, as if they'd all been saving it up. Afterwards, they thanked me as if I'd performed a public service, and in a way, I suppose I had. In small villages, the WI is often the social lifeblood of the community. The chance to come together, be entertained and have a good giggle – that's precious.

So now I'm a regular on the circuit. In the early days, I had to hustle for gigs, even auditioning at an event where prospective speakers were paraded before a panel of unsmiling women, their arms crossed as they judged us. It felt a bit like *The X Factor*, only with fewer sequins and no Simon Cowell. These days, I get booked through word of mouth, which is just as well because I'm no good at self-promotion. My talks are an amalgam of anecdotes about my medical and dental career, spliced with my earlier life as a comedy writer. The tone? Think "open surgery" meets Radio 4.

There's an old saying in comedy: "If the audience can see your feet, they'll trust you." It's true. That's why I refuse to stand behind a lectern. Nothing kills rapport like hiding behind a solid wooden structure, visible only from the nose up, like a head on a stick. The microphone crackled, the lights buzzed, and I could feel the laughter evaporating into the gloom. Never again.

With the WI, it's different. You feel the connection immediately – a warmth, an eagerness. These aren't women looking to be dazzled by someone more important than them. They want to feel like they know you, and if you can make them laugh as if you're all sharing a secret, so much the better.

Of course, it's not all plain sailing. There are tricky audiences, usually when I misjudge the room – too many stories about dentistry, not enough about writing sitcoms, or vice versa. But I'm better at reading the crowd now. I pace myself, punctuating my talk with slides and props, and I've learned to enjoy the silences as much as the laughs. It's a conversation, not a sprint.

These days, the hardest part isn't the performing, it's the travel. I've spent too many evenings squinting at blurry road signs, praying I'm not about to end up in a farmyard by mistake. But once I'm there, parked outside the village hall with its peeling paint and sagging noticeboard, I feel a strange kind of contentment. It's the same satisfaction I used to get from pulling off a tricky tooth extraction or delivering a well-timed punchline on a sitcom. It's the sense of having done something small but worthwhile.

When it's over, I pack up my props, say my goodbyes and drive home, replaying the evening in my mind. I sleep better now than I used to after gigs, though roadworks and motorway diversions have a habit of trying my patience. What I love, though, is knowing I've made people laugh. In a world that feels increasingly fraught, there's something deeply comforting about that – about finding joy in the familiar rhythms of a WI meeting, a cup of tea, a rendition of *Jerusalem*. It's not just entertainment, it's connection. And for that, I'm grateful.



Over 2500 patients each year benefit from the care at LOROS with the aim of helping patients live the fullest life they can. Patients can also receive care in their own homes. There are also counselling and therapy services available. The support is free but costs £8.5 million a year to deliver.
