Any new Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurers do contact us for any WI


queries. We can help in so many ways including sending promotional information and providing information on any upcoming deadlines. Lois and I are working hard to support all officers.

Join us in celebrating International Women's Day (8 March) in the year of our 110th anniversary!




WI Exhibition

Family Favourite Recipe

WEETABIX CAKE

Put 2 Weetabix or mug of Weetabix crumb, a mug of dried fruit, whatever you have available/like, a mug of brown sugar, a mug of milk in a bowl. Put all Into a mixing bowl, cover, and leave at least an hour to soak, or overnight

if you can wait that long, add 1 egg, mug of SR Flour, mix well. Put mixture into well-greased 1 x 2 lb or 2 x 1lb loaf tins. Sprinkle the top with chopped nuts if liked and bake 160° gas 5 for 1.25 hours for 2lb or 1 hour for 2 x 1lb or until a skewer inserted into the middle comes out clean.

Delicious served spread with butter, keeps well in an airtight container for about a week, freezes really well, either whole or in slices. I hope that you enjoy it, it's been a family favourite of mine for many years.

she saw the need in girls' schools for underwear and sanitary products.

This has now grown to supplying schools in Uganda and Sierra Leone. Reusable cotton sanitary pads are a vital item for these girls and a number of members offered to make these together with the cotton "goodie" bags which include soap, flannel etc provided to each girl/ woman. In addition, she sends powdered milk over for those babies whose mothers have died in childbirth and are cared for by their Grandmas and Aunties. She is also helping abused and homeless women in the UK in need.

Recycling underwear etc is hugely important, apparently 15 million bras are thrown away in the UK each year and end up in landfill.

Broughton Astley



Bill Haley was our first guest speaker of the year with his entertaining talk about "Life on board the Royal Yacht Britannia". Who knew that "Britannia" was designated a yacht so that she was not required to have a number painted on her side, as is the rule with all other vessels?

Serving in the Royal Navy for 27 years Bill spent eight years on "Britannia" as Warrant Officer

Navigation. When "Britannia" was launched early in 1954, HM Queen Elizabeth II decreed that it would have three aims: to visit as many Commonwealth countries as possible; to promote the United Kingdom and to serve as a hospital ship if required in times of conflict. Successive governments criticized the cost of maintaining "Britannia" but she brought in over ten-fold the income to the U.K. economy than the amount she cost to run.

Bill recounted many interesting and amusing facts from his time on board. "Britannia" was permanently on duty, carrying out ceremonial and state visits, NATO missions, promoting trade and industry and hosting ambassadors and politicians around the world.

Members have again donated their Christmas cards to be made into gift tags, and used postage stamps which are sent to the RNIB for fundraising. Our WI also collected a total of 55 plastic sweets tubs, which are recycled through the Tubs2pubs scheme.

The pantomime at The Concordia theatre was much enjoyed and many members are looking forward to several other theatre productions as booked for the next few months.
