Subscriptions

It's coming up to the time of year when subscriptions are due again, April. Please try and pay promptly to make life easier for your WI Treasurer. Each Member should pay their subscription or be removed from the MCS register for the WI. WI funds held cannot be used to subsidise subscription payment but the amount can be reduced to all Members under the flexibility initiative if your WI can afford to do this. Subscriptions for 2024 are £48.00 of which your WI keeps £23.60, the Federation share is £11.30 and National share £13.10. All WIs have the flexibility to reduce the WI portion they collect from their Members if the WI feel they have enough funds to support they expenditure of the group through the forthcoming year and leaving some funds in reserve for unexpected increase in hall hire or having more expensive speakers than planned.

Dual Members pay the same WI fee as your full Members and pay their Federation share and NFWI share to their main WI. If you need to clarify anything, ask any of the WI Advisers (contact details in the yearbook) or look online at the MY WI pages on the NFWI website. Whatever you pay I am sure you will find a year of fun and friendship within your WI.
