## **Electronic Communications to members**

There are exciting plans to send email communications to WI members in a trial direct mailing. This aim of this is to help get information out to you if you miss a meeting for some reason and to look at information in your own time. We can promise this will only ever be monthly and will relate

to just to Leicestershire & Rutland WI business and not include any information from NFWI,

advertisements or any other unrelated business. Feedback from MCS representatives and Secretaries in early discussions has been very positive about this plan. MCS representatives are in the process of updating email addresses to make sure we have the correct information for you. Our Board Trustee Sue Lobb, the Federation's MCS Support Special Appointment, reaffirms that any communications (emails included) sent out to individual members by individual email are always subject to strict GDPR (Data Protection) rules, and that any member not wishing to receive this proposed new style of individually will be given the opportunity to opt out.

All WI members are recorded on the National database, called the Membership Communication System (MCS). Overall, this is managed by National, but looked after locally by the Leics/Rutland Federation by WI House/Sue Lobb, and at individual WI level by appointed MCS Reps.

The vast majority of members these days have an email address stored alongside their details and this is for two important reasons: firstly, it acts as a member's username for her own individual access to the Members-only website called MyWI.org, and secondly, a member's email address allows direct contact with her individually by either National, Leics/Rutland Federation (i.e. WI House) or her own WI.

Finally, it is important to emphasise that this exercise is not intended at any point to replace the usual monthly mailing to your Secretaries; and, of course, we have not forgotten about those members who either do not have an email address or who choose not to have it recorded on the MCS. They will still get information from their monthly meetings, and from County News, and of course they can also ring WI House direct to book.

Your federation is only required to check that the wording of the resolution is clear, that the resolution is not repeating an issue on which the WI already has a mandate, and that the resolution does not go against the charitable objects of the NFWI. They cannot refuse to approve a resolution because they disagree with the content or the aims of the resolution.



#### The deadline for sharing your resolution with your federation for sign-off is 3 September 2023


#### Botcheston

Civil War on the side of Charles I.


The curator of the castle - Lesley Smith - was our speaker for the afternoon. After a stroll around the grounds and afternoon tea for lunch, Lesley became the

After rescuing her five and a half foot non venomous python from a pet shop, where it was near to death, her father, a cabaret performer himself, encouraged her to perform dances with the snake. She has travelled all

over the country even though there have been many hilarious escapades, including the snake escaping, later to be found in her neighbours airing cupboard and an ambulance being called.

#### Leire

Earlier in the season, we spent a lovely evening at The University of Leicester Botanic Garden, which is distinct from most gardens as they engage in scientific research and education. There are 16 acres of gardens displaying a wide range of plants, landscape features and listed buildings and is considered the most diverse garden in the East Midlands. The Greenhouses were closed for the evening, however we were able to enjoy many other areas including the Water and Sunken Gardens flanked by pillars and with beautiful roses, the Herbaceous Border, Medicinal and Herb Garden and lawns ponds and woodland areas. The Alliums were

stunning. Our guide was knowledgeable and passionate about the history and working practices at the garden. We then enjoyed tea and cakes in one of the characterful houses.





At our recent meeting, we welcomed Angela Dewes who gave a talk titled "From fleece to finish" Angela is a sheep farmer and fibre artist and explained the processes of caring for her sheep through to completing lovely items spun from their wool. Previously wool has been devalued in our society but is now being favoured for environment and sustainability reasons. Angela talked about the care of the sheep and the importance of keeping them free from stress.

After they have been sheared, the fleeces are sorted and trimmed and stored in potato sacks, they are then washed and dyed with either natural or synthetic dyes. Angela then demonstrated spinning the yarn on a drop spindle and also on her mechanical wheel. We were able to handle wool fibres from the different pedigrees of sheep which ranged from being soft to coarse and Angela displayed some of the finished skeins and beautiful

products she had created. In keeping with this theme, our competition was a picture of a sheep which was won by Lynette.

An interesting and enjoyable afternoon was had by all when we visited Alma Farm near Melton Mowbray. The tour and talk was fun as well as informative, who knew that producing milk for cheese was so complicated? The afternoon tea was delicious as

At our July meeting we enjoyed a speaker with a difference - Isobel Glover-Evans sharing her experiences from her time spent studying, working, and living in Japan.

We learned that Japanese culture combines old traditions with the very new in technology. One of the most obvious social conventions is the bow: everyone bows when you say hello,

goodbye, thank you or sorry. There is no tipping in Japanese restaurants and other places we might expect to tip: staff will always give the very best service they can. Isobel recalled an uncomfortable moment on discovering that - whilst being naked in a public place might feel a little strange to those from Western countries - bathing nude in communal baths is a normal activity in Japanese culture.

Traditionally, Japanese men were the breadwinners, but this is changing. Isobel spoke very highly of her host family who taught her so much — including being able to leave personal possessions in public places without fear of them being stolen. As a Western woman, Isobel felt that she may have been treated a little differently and with more caution.

Isobel introduced us to the basics of the language and told us that she found it an easier language to learn than French because, for example, there are no distinctions between genders or between singular and plural. We had fun as she taught us how to pronounce some everyday greetings. On that note, I will say *Ohayou gozaimasu.( Goodbye)!*
