






















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From the Board

The José Smart Award

José Smart was a founder member of the old Wigston Afternoon WI. She was an outstanding craftswoman who could turn her hand to many different skills. José was well loved by her fellow members and friends and is still greatly missed by those who knew her. Before Wigston Afternoon WI closed, a craft competition was established in José's name open to those who were new to crafts. This then became known as "The José Smart Award" when it was adopted by the Federation and is now held annually as a simple flower arranging competition. The Award itself is a handsome, engraved cut glass flower vase which the winner holds for 12 months.

Edith Buckley Poetry Competition

Edith Buckley was a much loved Founder Member of Blackfordby WI. Edith was also the treasurer for the Ivanhoe Group of WIs during the 1990s. Edith's niece decided that a poetry competition would be a good way to honour Edith's life.

CHRISTMAS CRACKER WALK AROUND LEICESTER LED BY STEVE BLUE BADGE TOURIST GUIDE

There were approximately 100 of us from various WI's across Leicestershire that walked over the 3 days. We all met at Bishop Street Methodist Church for a coffee and mince pie before we started our walks. The weather varied lots over the the 3 days and unfortunately some people had to cancel. This is a short version of the walks for those people.

Points of interest were: TOWN HALL SQUARE – Nativity scene and Santas grotto

Short talk on the actual date of the birth of Jesus 25th December. There is some controversy about this date. It was a custom of the pagans to celebrate on the same 25th December the birthday of the Sun, at which they kindled lights in the token of festivity. In these solemnities and revelries, the Christians also took part. Accordingly when the doctors of the church perceived that the Christians had a leaning to this festival, they took counsel and resolved that the true nativity should be solemnised on that day.

The invention of Santa Clause: Dutch settlers in the USA took stories of St Nicholas, 'Sinterklass as he'd come to be known in parts of Northern Europe, with them and Kris Kringle and St Nicholas/Sinterklass became Santa Clause.

TURKEY CAFÉ

The history of the turkey bird originates in Mexico, exported to Europe via Spain and then introduced in Britain in 1541.

AREA OF THE NOW NATWEST BANK GALLOWTREE GATE

Explanation about the old postage system and how it arrived by stagecoach and the introduction of the penny post system which in that time enabled people to send Xmas cards very cheaply. Postmen used to wear red uniforms.

CLOCK TOWER

History of the Xmas Tree and how they were introduced. Talked about some of the old shops including Lewis's and how it was designed to represent a cruse ship. There were also two Woolworths, big and little.

HIGHCROSS SHOPPING CENTRE

History about the inventor of the Christmas card, Henry Cole and then on to see the biggest reindeer near John Lewis and brief talk on how Rudolph was invented by Robert Lacey in 1939. Walked up to the old grammar school building in the Highcross centre to learn about the inventor of the Christmas cracker, Tom Smith.

HIGH CROSS MONUMENT

On a plaque here there is the only picture of the Leicester Town Waites forerunners of the police force as we know it today. They were also musicians in their own right who patrolled and entertained in the streets of Leicester.

GUILDHALL

Brief history about the banning of Christmas in the 16th century. Nothing mentioned in the bible about Christmas.

SILVER STREET

To learn more about the famous Royal Opera House featuring many well known artists including Morecombe and Wise in their very early days.

PAWN BROKERS SHOP NEAR LEICESTER MARKET

Information about St Nicholas who was the patron saint of children, sailors, merchants, thieves and pawnbrokers . He was of Greek descent and was born during the third century in the village of Patara.

OLD FISHMARKET

Used to be a very busy place where people would come to buy their poultry and vegetables for Christmas

BACK TO TOWN HALL SQUARE

History of Christmas Carols

The walk and the history were portrayed exceptionally well by Steve who also sneaked in a few Xmas jokes on the way (we never did get to hear the rude one!)

In 1870 Mr Nestle was experimenting with chocolate and invented milk chocolate by adding dried milk, there had only been dark chocolate before. 30 years later he developed white chocolate which was much sweeter and had much more sugar than other varieties. Different chocolates temper at different



temperatures and there must be a minimum of 22% cocoa solids by law for the product to be called chocolate.

Members enjoyed tasting the delicious samples of chocolate passed around and Jan made a snowman display to use as a raffle prize at our December meeting.

Our November speakers were Nikki Coles-Cross and her colleague Lindsey, lottery fundraising manager, who gave an inspirational presentation on the work of LOROS. Leicestershire and Rutland Organisation for the Relief Of Suffering provides care and services for adult patients with life limiting conditions, as well as caring for and supporting their families and carers. They care for over 3,000 patients every year

in Leicester, Leicestershire and Rutland in Outpatients and Inpatients with clinical nurse specialists, palliative care in the home and night service, Day Therapy for patients and their families and carers, Social and Spiritual support, complementary therapies and counselling. LOROS needs over £8 million a year to function and two thirds of this is earned by fundraising events, their lottery, shops and two cafes, as well as legacies. They could not carry on without the dedication of over 1,300 wonderful volunteers.



Groups of members helped to plant our Remembrance poppies around our village and received many messages of appreciation. They make a big impact at

the time of year when we wish to remember all those who were lost during times of conflict.

Members saved their Christmas cards and again upcycled them into gift tags, which we place in various locations around our village for residents to help themselves and these always seem to be well received.

At our October meeting we welcomed Alex the Marketing and Fundraising Assistant from Charity Link.

Charity Link provides support for individuals and families in financial hardship or crisis in Leicester, Leicestershire, Rutland and Northamptonshire.

We presented her with a cheque for £358.40 raised from our Strawberry Tea held in July. For every £10 donated the charity can raise £50 from charitable trusts so this means that our
