

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

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NFWI Annual Meeting Cardiff 2023—by Lynda Blackwell, Houghton on the Hill WI

22 of us including the 15 delegates, some observers and officers boarded a coach at WI House and set off on our journey to Cardiff. Arriving at our very comfortable hotel at 2.30pm. The afternoon and evening were our own to explore or just relax.

St David's Hall was the venue and it felt very strange and exciting to be in a building with so many other women after the last few years. I'm sure everyone felt the same as there was a buzz in the air and bright colours all around. By 10.30 we were seated ready to begin the meeting, which began as always with Jerusalem. Appointment of returning officers and tellers were made, standing orders adopted.

The Chair gave her address, saying there were nationally over 180,000 members of the WI. The numbers had been same for a while but she was convinced that over the next few years the numbers would rapidly increase especially as there were now Virtual WI's and supporter memberships.

The morning's speaker was Ebony Rainford-Brent, who described her childhood in Lambeth through to playing cricket for England and is now a TV and radio presenter. Her story was amazing as her first sport was football but at 10 she had the opportunity to attend a cricket coaching day and fell in love with it.



Next was the Resolution Debate. The proposer and seconder putting forward their motion. Their case seemed to very much focus on the poor state of the river Wye. An expert then presented a case to support the motion, which unfortunately was very emotive, rather than always being factual. Though he did include the fact that last year despite the increase of sewerage being pumped into rivers there had been far fewer prosecutions than in previous years. The expert presenting the alternative view spoke far more objectively. Water, he said, certainly needs cleaning, however focusing on bathing areas diverted money from more effective policies and that UK water is too cold and therefore dangerous to swim in for long. He maintained our focus should have been on wildlife rather than people as wildlife doesn't demand virtually sterile water. There were some very good points made by members, river swimming was elitist not inclusive to everyone, as the vast majority of the population would not be able to access it, through poverty or distance. WI's in farming communities were annoyed that it placed extra pressure on farmers. I seriously considered whether, where I had been given the authority to change the yes votes to no, but decided not to as the mood in the room was strongly in favour of a yes. I feel that in many ways the outcome of these debates is always a forgone conclusion before the meeting even starts.

A delegate raised this and said she felt that there should be a way of voting after delegates had presented both sides to their WIs after and not before the AGM. The chair said this was something they would look into. The result of voting was 4007 yes votes and 742 nos. It was therefore carried by 84%.

We then broke for lunch. The first part of the afternoon was given to the presenting of awards for competitions and individual WIs who had gained the highest number of new members. Several Institutes more than doubled their membership and now have over 100 members.

The final speaker was Laura McAllister who is the first woman to be appointed onto the executive body of UEFA. She is also a Professor of Public Policy in Cardiff.

We ended the afternoon with singing Jerusalem, Land of our Fathers in Welsh and the National Anthem. We found our coach and were back at WI House at 8.30pm.

I had an extremely enjoyable 36 hours and also to encourage you to go as a delegate if you get the chance.

We had a very interesting talk and demonstration from Maggie Cooper, a traditional willow weaver and basket maker. She is a Yeoman Member of the Worshipful Company of Basket

Makers and began learning the craft in the 1960's in the arts and crafts circuit in Birmingham. She brought with her beehives, eel traps, salmon traps and crayfish traps - all made from willow or cane from their local habitat.

Maggie gave us an insight into the different sort of baskets that had been made and developed according to their local need and purpose. It was such a fascinating talk not only on the skill of Maggie's basket weaving but also the history that went with it. She has travelled to Australia, Austria, Denmark, Sweden and Ireland to learn new skills in weaving. She moved from Birmingham to Castle Donington and has since discovered that Castle Donington was a basket weaving village. She was invited to give her input at The Leicester Museum when archaeologists found some giant eel traps embedded in a riverbank in Leicestershire and helped produce replicas of these.

She brought twine in for us to have a go at making twine bracelets, some were more successful than others, but we all had fun having a go.
