As always, the meal was delicious, the staff well organised and efficient and the company of fellow members enjoyable. The speaker this time was Graham Short a Micro -artist.

He works from midnight to 5am in the Birmingham Jewellery Quarter in order to avoid vibration from traffic. He has regular Botox injections to his eyelids, takes beta blockers, potassium and magnesium to lower his heart rate and wearing a stethoscope monitors his heart whilst engraving with very fine needles between heartbeats. He produces 4 items a year. 

Jo Golby came to tell us about a woman's role in society from 1850 to 1930. In the early years it was divided between the haves and have-nots. While the better off had servants to wait upon them, obviously the lower orders were the servants, although some women stayed home to raise their children, working from home as seamstresses or doing other out work.

This mostly carried on until 1914 when WW1 happened. Although some women went into such occupations as nursing and joined Queen Mary's Domestic Service, more were put to work in the munitions factories which was dangerous work. They could also join the Land Army and in 1917 the WRNS were formed and in 1918 the WRAF was formed.

When war ended on 11.11.1918, things seemed to get better until the Spanish Flu epidemic came along and killed millions. The country finally recovered and enjoyed the coronation of George VI.

Sandy Leong told the story of Lady Jane Grey, the forgotten Tudor in October's meeting

Jane lived at Bradgate until she was nine, her parents were not loving and she immersed herself in her studies and became known as a scholar. Jane and Edward were educated together at Syon House in London until she was 12 when she returned to Bradgate for about three years.

Sadly Jane was surrounded by scheming and ambitious men who had no interest in her wishes and it was arranged for her to marry Lord Guildford Dudley. Thomas Seymour persuaded the dying young King Edward to nominate Jane as first in the line of

succession giving the Duke of Northumberland (and father of Dudley) an opportunity to present the reluctant 16-year-old Jane to the people of London as their queen.

We enjoyed another excellent talk by Richard Warren. His subject this time was Foxton Locks and the History of canals. Did you know that the first canal in Britain was built by the Romans. It was not until 1759 that the golden age of canals began. When they wanted to build a canal from the East Midlands to London there was a problem in that there is a difference of 175 ft between Foxton and Watford and the answer was Foxton Locks which has a unique system of locks. Foxton locks were renovated and in 1944 a man called Rolt went on holiday on a canal , wrote a book about it and canal holidays became very fashionable. In fact there are now more boats than there were during what is known as Canal Mania.





Our visit to the Secret Garden was cancelled because of a slight problem called torrential rain. However a couple of members enjoyed the Public Art Walk around Leicester. Sunny but cold. We learnt so much about the unseen parts of Leicester.

Broughton Astley

Sandy Leong gave us a fascinating look into "The History of Witches" at our October meeting.

The witch craze started in Europe in the 1500 to 1600s. At this time "wise women" used their knowledge, such as herbal potions, to cure various illnesses. However, if these didn't work the women soon became blamed. There is documented evidence of women being accused of witchcraft in Leicestershire in the early 1600s and in Husbands Bosworth 15 women were accused of witchcraft.

Many members and friends have been busy knitting and crocheting hundreds of red, white and purple poppies for a new poppy display. Four nets of poppies will be draped over the hedges surrounding our War Memorial for the Remembrance period, along side our 'plastic bottle' poppies
