



Subscriptions and Flexible Subscriptions

Subscriptions for 2023 are due in April and will be £46.00 for the forthcoming year. Each Member should pay their subscriptions and WI funds cannot be used to subsidise subscriptions.

What can be used to reduce the amount paid is the Subscription Flexibility that is available to all WIs. The full Subscription rate is split three ways £12.60 is the NFWI share, £10.80 is the Federation share and £22.60 is the WI share. All WIs have the flexibility to reduce the WI portion that they keep, to their members.

This is a decision that should be discussed by your Committee each year and then put to your Members. Your committee will have to decide if your WI has sufficient funds to run and put on events and meetings for the Members with the funds you have in hand, as well as reserves for a "rainy day". Each WI is different and there are increased costs for speakers and hall hire to take into consideration. Some WIs may not be able to reduce Subscriptions at all, to provide the program they have planned. Members can also choose to donate up to the full amount if they wish.

Dual Members only pay the same WI portion as your full Members. They pay the NFWI and Federation portion to their main WI.

If you need any more information, you can contact any of the WI Advisers or look on the MYWI pages on the NFWI website. Whatever you pay I am sure that you will find a year of fun and friendship for your WI Subscription.

In Memory—Freda Williams 1929—2022

Everyone at Ullesthorpe WI was saddened to hear that Freda died on 5th December 2022. Freda joined our WI in the mid 1950s and was an enthusiastic and dedicated member until March 2021. She served on the committee for a number of years and was President from 1973 to 1976. She was actively involved with the Wycliffe Group, a very enthusiastic and long-standing member of the Federation Home Economics Committee and was elected onto the Executive Committee, now the Board of Trustees, for a spell. Freda took delight from being involved in all aspects of the WI and attended the Federation ACM and National Annual Meetings whenever possible. She could be relied upon to enter our competitions and participate in any outings we organised, especially to the Hinckley Concordia, and promoted the work of ACWW.

Freda was a skilled embroiderer and we treasure the President's Tablecloth she made that will continue to be used at every meeting. She loved Denman and during one weekend she struck up a friendship with members from Stretton-on-Dunsmore WI in Warwickshire. A 'twinning' arrangement was formed whereby members from Ullesthorpe would visit Stretton for their August meeting one year and return the favour the following year. This continued for many years until Stretton WI sadly closed in 2019.

We have lost a true champion of the WI but have very happy memories of her friendship and dedication.


