

Jeryl is experienced and has a range of interesting hobbies so should make an enjoyable talk. Also you may get to ask all the questions you have wanted to ask of NFWI!




Leisure Committee

Family Favourite Recipe—Salmon, purple sprouting broccoli & sweet potato mash

1 1/2 tbsp sesame oil

1 tbsp low-salt soy sauce

Thumb sized piece of ginger, grated

1 garlic clove, crushed

1 tsp honey

2 sweet potatoes, scrubbed and cut into wedges

1 lime, cut into wedges

2 boneless skinless salmon fillets

250g purple sprouting broccoli

1 tbsp sesame seeds

1 red chilli, thinly sliced (optional)

Heat oven to 200C/180 fan/gas 6 and line a baking tray with parchment.

Mix together ½ tbsp. sesame oil, the soy, ginger, garlic and honey. Put the sweet potato wedges, skin and all, into a glass bowl with the lime wedges. Cover and microwave on high for 12-14 mins until completely soft.

Meanwhile, spread the broccoli and salmon out on the baking tray. Spoon over the marinade and season. Roast in the oven for 10-12 mins, then sprinkle over the sesame seeds.

Remove the lime wedges and roughly mash the sweet potato. Mix in the remaining sesame oil and chilli and season. Divide between plates along with the salmon and broccoli.

So as an arts theatre manager, he started to learn how to sew from his wife's instructions. This led him to apply and then be selected to appear on BBC TV's "The Great British Sewing Bee". Everyone was amazed and interested in his whole experience of making face-masks and clothes for the programme. After his talk, members could admire some of his garments and other literature, plus items of a sewing nature. . He also makes a podcast about his life now.

Member Gillian Weston came into the meeting wearing a jacket which she then entered into the competition for the evening "an item you have sewn". This won the most points, to be included in the end-of-year cup for the competition.

Oakham

Ten members of Oakham WI travelled to Peterborough Cathedral to visit the exhibition "The Longest Yarn, a thread through history". The concept was devised by an English woman living in Normandy who started by knitting a topper for her gate as part of her village's annual D day celebrations. This grew to an 80 metre display and the rest is history. An army of knitters and crocheters, mainly based in England, including Micheldean WI, produced the

eighty displays covering all aspects of the D day landings, with scenes based on memories and photographs of the events.

We were stunned by the level of detail in each display and the skills utilised. A really enjoyable and inspiring visit.

Woodhouse Eaves

We were treated to an enjoyable and enlightening evening by retired policeman, Richard Warren who now gives talks on Leicester's oldest suburb: Highfields.

Outlining a brief historical and geographical development of Leicester, that took us from the 13th Century and the time of Simon de Montfort through the late Georgian and Victorian periods to the 20th century, it was possible to see how and why Highfields became a large and important suburb of Leicester.

Stretching from the site of the old 1801 Toll House at the junction of Charles Street and London Road and going south out of the city on the A6, Highfields is located all along the left hand side opposite Victoria Park and eastwards behind these houses where once there were agricultural and grazing lands.

Over the centuries competing political factions and Ecclesiastical bodies had acquired large parcels of land. To this day it's possible to recognise land originally owned by the church through street names; Prebend and Glebe.

We were surprised to learn that the New Walk Museum had

originally been built as a school for children of the Dissenters and Hillcrest Hospital was once the Victorian workhouse where Joseph Merrick, the famous 'Elephant Man' had been obliged to live during the cold, winter months. Then the 1890's saw the former Campbell Street railway station developed into The London Midland as the line reached Leicester.

Following the 1834 Reform Act, Highfields saw the construction of both affordable, cheap housing and later in the Victorian period, large, stylish houses with in-door plumbing and ornate exterior details which can still be seen to this day.

After an illuminating presentation, we all agreed that we had definitely learnt things about Leicester's first suburb that we didn't know before!



Cossington

Our members have had a busy month. We welcomed the Cosby Yarn Bomb founders to our Members Meeting. They told us how they met and how it grew gaining many members. Over the years it has become really well known with the Cosby village getting involved for their open weekend and a lot of visitors coming to view their amazing exhibits.
